



## NOVEMBER 8<sup>th</sup> GENERAL ELECTION RESULTS

In yesterday's General Election, Ohio voters cast ballots for Governor, U.S. Senate, U.S House, all constitutionally elected statewide officials, 99 members of the Ohio House of Representatives, half of the Ohio Senate, and more. New legislative maps adopted by the Ohio Redistricting Commission forced many legislative incumbents to run in new districts, however that did not impact the Republican stronghold throughout Ohio. According to Secretary of State Frank LaRose, more than 1.4 million Ohioans voted early or absentee, outpacing the 2018 Gubernatorial Statewide Election. In all, more than 4 million Ohioans voted in this year's General Election.

### OHIO HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

All 99 of Ohio's House seats were on the ballot yesterday. After redistricting, members were running in the newly drawn districts for the first time. Republicans, who currently hold a 64 to 35 super-majority, remain in firm control of the House, and even added to their majority after last night's election.

Notably, Republicans defeated two current members of the House Minority Leadership team, including House Minority Leader Thomas West and House Assistant Minority Whip Richard Brown (although the close vote count will trigger a recount in this race). Republicans also added to their majority with the election of Josh Williams, who won in the open seat previously held by Democrat Lisa Sobecki, and Nick Santucci, who won in the open seat previously held by Democrat Michael O'Brien.

The Democrats picked up one seat previously held by Republican Tom Brinkman with Democrat Rachel Baker defeating Republican candidate Jennifer Giroux.

Other notable races include:

- Current Republican House Member DJ Swearingen defeating Democrat Jim Obergefell
- Republican Incumbent Derek Merrin retaining his seat against Democrat Erika White
- Democrat State Representative Dan Troy defeating challenger George Phillips
- Democrat Incumbent Mary Lightbody preserving her seat against Republican Jill Rudler
- Republican Gail Pavliga retaining her seat against former Democratic House member Kathleen Clyde

# OHIO SENATE

In the Ohio Senate, 17 of the 33 districts were up for election yesterday. Republicans added to their super-majority with Michele Reynolds defeat of Democrat incumbent Tina Maharath. The Republicans will hold a 26-7 majority in the next General Assembly. According to Senate President Matt Huffman, the last time the Republicans held a 26-7 majority was in 1951.

In a close race, Republican incumbent Kristina Roegner narrowly defeated her Democrat challenger, Patricia Goetz. Incumbent Republican Senators Nathan Manning and Michael Rulli handedly won their Democrat opponents in what were expected to be competitive races.

## U.S. HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

After redistricting earlier this year, Ohio lost one congressional seat due to a slower growth in population than other states, going from 16 to 15 Congressional seats. While Ohio Republicans still hold a solid 10-5 majority in the U.S. House, Democrats cut into that majority with wins in three competitive races including current Democrat Ohio House Member Emilia Sykes defeating Republican Madison Gesiotto-Gilbert in Northeast Ohio, Democrat incumbent Congresswoman Marcy Kaptur winning re-election against challenger J.R. Majewski, and longtime Republican incumbent Congressman Steve Chabot losing to Cincinnati City Councilman Greg Landsman.

# U.S. SENATE

One of the most highly anticipated races in Ohio was the replacement of retiring U.S. Senator Rob Portman. Current Democratic Congressman Tim Ryan faced off against Republican venture capitalist and author J.D. Vance. As expected, the vote count was closer in this race than other statewide races. However, Trump-backed Vance defeated Ryan by nearly 8 percentage points.

# SUPREME COURT OF OHIO

Judicial candidates for Ohio's Supreme Court also appeared on yesterday's ballot. Two of the court's sitting Justices sought to replace current Chief Justice Maureen O'Connor, who is ineligible to run for reelection because of the mandatory age restrictions. Republican Justice Sharon Kennedy defeated Democrat Justice Jennifer Brunner for the high seat. Justice Brunner will continue to serve as a Justice on the court as her seat is not up for re-election until 2026. In addition, incumbent Republicans Pat DeWine and Pat Fischer were both reelected for another six-year term. Since Justice Kennedy will vacate her existing seat on the court to become Chief Justice, Governor DeWine will appoint her replacement. The Governor's Republican appointment to the court will leave a 4-3 Republican majority on the court.

Ohio has a long, historical reputation of being a political bell-weather state, but that has changed in recent elections with Republicans dominating statewide elections for the past decade. This year was no different with Governor DeWine and Lieutenant Governor Husted easily outpacing their Democrat opponents by 63%. Despite a difficult primary campaign where Governor DeWine overcame two far-right opponents, DeWine and Husted easily won reelection and helped carry the rest of the Republican statewide ticket across the finish line.
